

recent study says that we, as Americans, are more disconnected than ever, though we are surrounded by more people than at any moment in history. Twenty-five percent of all Americans say they have no one with whom to confide in, and the number of people we report being in our closest circle of friends has dropped from three to two.


Through a variety of social factors—longer commutes, more meals eaten alone, less face-to-face interaction—we've become socially isolated and divided. Founders Glazebrook, Marshall and Ross faced a similarly divided America when they founded ATO in the aftermath of the Civil War. The three battle-seasoned youth saw a need to bring the nation together, and provide a place where people could connect with one another in meaningful ways.

In the first issue of the *Palm*, Joseph R. Anderson spoke to the purpose of the Fraternity. His words ring as true today as they did in 1880.

“...To harmonize the world; to bring man into closer and more friendly relations to his fellow-man; to lessen the burdens of existence; to increase the sum of human happiness; to elevate and ennoble mankind—these are the objects at which the present venture aims. Our ideas are not those of the visionary; our methods are not the wild fancies of the maddened enthusiast; our mission is to educate man to a high conception of the nobility of human life—to make the child a befitting father to the noble, generous, whole-souled man. Opposition, persistent and sincere, we have had, and will continue to have; misconceptions of our aims and endeavors will always exist; but we shall strive, by a calm and dignified presentation of the principles of Alpha Tau Omega, to secure the hearty cooperation of all who desire the elevation of humanity to a plane above and beyond the sphere of a narrow and suicidal prejudice. Men of calm, unbiased judgment, at our leading seats of learning, have long since given in their adhesion to the Fraternity system. Our ranks today contain men of influence and position in every walk of life; the clergy, the legal fraternity, the literary circle—all are represented upon the rolls of Alpha Tau Omega.

Our life-work is auspiciously begun; the very walls of our Universities and Colleges re-echo the praises now upon the lips of all. Let there be no relaxing in our labors, no quailing before the opposition we may encounter, no acting on the defensive—but a bold, aggressive campaign in behalf of all that is dear to the heart of each and every member of Alpha Tau Omega; a mighty effort to bring order out of the chaos of human love and human hate; to make life the realization of man's highest, holiest, noblest impulses...”

The battlefield has changed, but the war to unite wages on.

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

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REVIVING THE COLLEGE EXPERIENCE

ason Williams was miserable. His college experience to date existed in a classroom and a stale dorm room—neither of which lent itself to much personal interaction.

“I just knew there was more to college than this,” he said.

The 2005 Indiana State initiate went to college knowing it was supposed to be a big experience. He expected to meet people and connect with them in a meaningful way, all while being able to develop as an individual.

“I wanted to find people I could connect with and be around and care about,” he said.

He knew what he wanted, but it quickly became clear that he wasn’t going to find what he was looking for in dorm life. “In the dorms it was just me and my roommate and no one ever really came out of their room. If you didn’t see someone from your floor for a few days, it was no big

deal.” Fortunately, ATO and the recruitment process weren’t far away.

A GROWING TREND

Jason’s experience in the dorms is a perfect example of a growing trend in American culture both at the collegiate level and in adult life.

Today, 25 percent of Americans say they have no one with whom they can discuss personal troubles, according to a comprehensive new evaluation of the decline of social ties in the United States. This is more than double the number who were

similarly isolated in 1985.

Additionally, the amount of people considered to be in the closest circle of confidants has dropped from three to two.

Even churches, typically an arena of personal connections, have to work hard to help people connect in small groups. This is especially important for churches like Grace Community Church in Noblesville, Ind. where average Sunday attendance is nearly 6,000.

Ron Stohler, pastor of Growth and Groups at Grace Community Church, has seen the trend first hand. "We have this idea in our head that we can go it alone," he said. "And I've seen it in some of the outreach work we've done where people know they want to change, but are too ashamed to ask for help."

The Grace Community Church's Growth and Groups program is the church's effort to change that trend and fulfill a need. Stohler works full time to create strong, personal

relationships through small groups. "We are a relational people," he said. "We're called to try and create close personal relationships."

Stohler points to fraternities as an important place to provide the opportunities to develop a sense of relationships and community. "You guys are creating a unique space where young men can find something they typically wouldn't find in a campus setting," he said. "These relationships last a lifetime. For a lot of people, after school they can't find that again."

Fraternities, like churches, are a place where personal relationships are fundamental to success and existence. Fraternities are also working hard to provide an experience full of meaningful relationships and development opportunities.

For Williams, this is exactly the kind of experience he was searching for. "In the Fraternity you go to things together, you work together in

projects and share experiences together," he said. "Basically, you live life together sharing the ups and downs."

DECLINING CAPITAL

But the fact remains that social capital—stocks of social trust, norms and networks that people can draw upon to solve common problems—continues to decline.

According to Robert D. Putnam, professor of public policy at Harvard and author of *Bowling Alone*, a book about increasing social isolation in the United States, "For most of the 20th century, Americans were becoming more connected with family and friends, and there was more giving of blood and money, and all of those trend lines turn sharply in the middle 60s and have gone in the other direction ever since."

This stems from several factors.

According to the American Census Bureau, Americans spend more than 100 hours commuting to work each year, exceeding the two weeks of vacation time (80 hours) frequently taken by workers over the course of a year. Putnam says that every 10 minute increase in commute time makes it 10 percent less likely that people will establish and maintain close social ties.

Technology has also contributed to our overall isolation. The average individual avoids face-to-face communication and opts instead to interact through cell phones, text messaging, e-mail and social networking sites like myspace.com and facebook.com. According to a *USA Today* survey, 5 billion text messages are sent each year in the United States.

Myspace.com has more than 106 million registered users, attracting 230,000 new users per day.

One could argue that these numbers would suggest that we are actually more connected, and that our social capital is actually increasing by the very nature of being able to instantly reach out to a broader network. But Lynn Smith-Lovin, a Duke University sociologist says that's not the case. "We're not saying people are completely isolated, they may have 600 friends on Facebook.com and e-mail 25 people a day, but they are not discussing matters that are personally important."

Also contributing to the decline in social capital, is the increased number of meals that are consumed alone. According to Putnam, Americans go on 60 percent fewer picnics today and families eat dinner together 40 percent less often compared with 1965.

A stale, empty hallway was all that greeted Jason Williams, Indiana State '05, when he lived in the dorms. That's why he joined ATO.

The meal issue is one that specifically resonates with fraternities. In ATO, there is a strong correlation between successful chapters and those that eat meals together. "When we look at our True Merit chapters, an overwhelming number of them have meals together at least once per week," said Director of Chapter Services **Justin Fine, Maryland '01**.

The decline in social capital presents an interesting challenge to ATO. How can the Fraternity continue to live up to the ideas penned in the Creed in an

increasingly fragmented America? Compared to the circumstances that led to ATO's founding, it should be relatively easy.

One of the fundamental principles of Alpha Tau Omega is that it will bring men together in relationships that are "as strong as right itself" and "as lasting as humanity."

HYPER-COMMUNITY

said Stohler. "You're living together, eating together, serving together and having fun together. This is a time in your life when you are plugged into a situation where you are doing life together."

This is the same situation that Stohler tries to create every day. "There is this longing in people for a relational connection," he said. "It's embedded in our DNA but it takes time to develop. But it's a rewarding experience when you see people make that transition."

In order to establish a good network of close relationships, there must be a common place, common purpose, and common possessions, according to Randy Frazee, pastor and author from Pantego Bible Church in Arlington, Texas. ATO provides all three.

The Fraternity's ultimate challenge, then, seems to be how to take full advantage of the opportunity to play an important role in the resuscitation of community.

A major consideration in determining how to play a role in resuscitating community is how to renovate and build physical structures.

Patrick Alderdice is president of Pennington and Company, a full-service fundraising, consulting and public relations firm that has worked with 75 different campuses and 205 different housing corporations to

campaign for new physical structures. "One of the biggest mistakes we see is chapter houses that provide everything and the kitchen sink in individual rooms," he said.

"This takes the fraternity out of the fraternity house. Guys aren't coming out of rooms and the sense of community and brotherhood that is built in there is going away. We see that as a significant issue."

This counters current conventional wisdom that suggests students demand individualized rooms. In fact, what the students want, and what they say they want, are two different ends of the spectrum.

According to **William Muir, Kansas State '67**, Assistant Vice President of Institutional Advancement at Kansas State University, the housing options that feature newer, individualized rooms for students have a lower occupancy rate than those rooms that are older, but are set up as a shared living environment.

Another key component in the physical structure is the full-service kitchen and dining area. Alderdice says there is an increasing trend for housing corporations to do away with kitchens altogether. "This is another area where you can really shoot yourself in the foot in a lot of ways," he said. "All of the alumni I speak with, their fondest memories are the meals they ate together,

and the socialization that took place in that setting. That's an important skill to teach men today."

Communal bathrooms are another important social setting. "I know it sounds a little strange, but one of the main places that people socialize is in the bathrooms," he said. "The right way to do it is to do communal bathrooms with individual shower stalls, instead of giving everyone their own individual shower. Not only does that get expensive, but it eliminates an important socialization area."

"I don't really know how to explain it," said Andy Newton, Kansas State '00. "There's just something bonding about that experience of standing there, brushing your teeth or shaving and talking to other guys."

THE ATO EXPERIENCE

The obvious question, then, is why aren't Fraternities overflowing with membership? The answer is they should be.

In instances where ATO is able to provide a

model example of what a Fraternity should be like, membership is high. At Pepperdine University, ATO colonized with 39 members. Since colonizing, the group has soared to well over 60 members, which is larger than the average ATO chapter.

At Texas Tech University, ATO colonized with 35 members after being approached by a group of undergraduates on campus who hadn't found what they were looking for in terms of a college experience.

At Baylor University, the group colonized with 35 members, and within one year of chartering had eclipsed the 100 member mark. The chapter also received Top Chapter Runner-Up honors at the recent ATO Congress.

"Clearly there is a need for the ATO experience," said Associate Director of Expansion **Steve Silcock, Washington State '01**. "We come on to campuses and provide people with something that they're looking for, and aren't able to find anywhere else."

The trouble lies in

the dysfunctional chapters. Dysfunctional chapters provide a negative idea of what it means to be a part of a group, re-enforcing the idea that a fraternity isn't the right place to go to establish a meaningful connection with other people. "The dysfunctional chapters

perpetuate the stereotypes associated with Fraternities," said ATO Chief Executive Officer **Wynn Smiley, Illinois/Purdue '99**. "If you see a group of people who aren't contributing on campus, aren't making grades, and aren't enthusiastic about the organization, you aren't going to look to them as your place to find a personal connection."

To make sure that ATO is a place where people expect to find meaningful connections and relationships, ATO needs to do what it has been doing for over 140 years, binding men together in a brotherhood based upon eternal and immutable principles.

"Through the time you spend together and the brotherly bond that comes from the Ritual, you get a real unique relationship," said Williams.

But, in order to make any kind of measurable dent in the decline of social capital, the Fraternity needs to extend its experience to more people, with more fervor.

"The Fraternity already does an excellent job of providing young men with meaningful, positive experiences," said Smiley. "The ongoing challenge is bringing that same experience to more individuals."

The need to form relationships and connect with people in meaningful ways is there. It's ATO's responsibility to fill that need.

The power of the ATO experience is in the relationships formed and the impact members have on each other, on the communities they live in and the world they shape. It is ATO's Creed that this same experience be extended to as many people as possible, in order to truly know no North, no South, no East, no West. ✕

Alpha Tau Omega is pleased to honor Red McCombs as just the fourth recipient of the Distinguished Alumnus Award. The Distinguished Alumnus Award is presented to ATO Alumni who have demonstrated achievement and leadership with integrity in their respective fields.

Previous recipients of the award include former president of Texas Instruments Erik Jonsson, Rensselaer Poly '24, Ambassador Roy Huffington, Southern Methodist '35, chief executive officer of an independent international oil and gas company—and Lew Platt, Cornell '60, former CEO and President of Hewlett-Packard.

McCombs, a 1949 Texas initiate, was born in Spur, Texas, and attended Southwestern University and the University of Texas at Austin School of Business and School of Law. He left law school in his second year and began his career as a salesman in the automobile business in Corpus Christi in 1950. In 1958 he relocated to San Antonio where he became a partner, then sole owner of Red McCombs Automotive. In addition to his auto interests, he is co-founder of Clear Channel Communications and of McCombs Energy in Houston and is active in a variety of other businesses.

McCombs has held leadership roles in many national, state, and local organizations including Chamber of Commerce, United Way and San Antonio's World Fair.



This program is binding on all Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity new members, existing members, alumni, chapters, house corporations, foundations, alumni organizations, and the National Fraternity. YOUR DECISION TO ACCEPT MEMBERSHIP OR CONTINUE YOUR CURRENT MEMBERSHIP IN ALPHA TAU OMEGA FRATERNITY AFTER AUGUST 15, 2006, MEANS YOU HAVE AGREED TO AND ARE BOUND BY THE TERMS OF THIS PROGRAM AS CONTAINED IN THE PLAN DOCUMENT AND RULES, A COMPLETE COPY OF WHICH IS AVAILABLE FOR YOU TODAY, AND IS FOUND AT THE FOLLOWING LOCATIONS: www.ato.org/pdfs/claimresolution. This will be true both during your membership and after your membership should you terminate for any reason. Likewise, the terms of the Claim and Dispute Resolution Program are binding on Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity, Inc.; the terms can only be modified by providing advance notice of the change to members. While both you and Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity retain all substantive legal rights and remedies under this Program, you and Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity are both waiving all rights which either may have with regard to trial by jury for personal injury, property damage, contract or any other related matters in state or federal court. This Plan covers any legal or equitable claim for personal injury, property damage, equity or breach of contract, arising out of any tort, statute, contract or law.

10 DAYS 3 WORLD RECORDS ONE MAN

In July of 2006, Michael O'Shaughnessy broke three world records in the span of 10 days when he crossed three enormous bodies of water—the English Channel, Loch Ness, and the Irish Sea—on nothing more than a paddleboard.

He accomplished all three paddleboard excursions

in a combined time of less than 14 hours.

To hear O'Shaughnessy tell it, it was all just a product of setting goals.

"This was all really just an extension of years of goal writing," said the 1989 Central Florida initiate. "Years ago I wrote a goal to do a 10k, which turned into a half-marathon, which turned into a marathon, to an Ironman event and eventually to this."

For the past 25 years, O'Shaughnessy has taken time to type out his goals for the year, and post them above his computer and inside of his medicine cabinet. He then goes about meticulously

checking off each achieved goal.

"Successful people understand that they can achieve anything they want if they set goals and define them specifically," he said. "The only thing you can't control is the timing factor."

O'Shaughnessy's commitment to goal-setting began after college, after a visit to his father. "I was kind of lost and didn't really know what to do with this real world that I was getting into," he said. "But when I visited my dad, I saw this list of goals he had taped to the medicine cabinet, and that's when it hit me...wow, you can plan ahead in your life

and try and be proactive about achieving things."

And achieve

O'Shaughnessy has. He's the author of Millennium Woman and Blue Collar Ironman, he started a real estate business at age 26 and became a self-

made millionaire by the age of 31, and he's started several major paddleboarding races. But he says the Trinity Paddle is his biggest achievement to date.

"This was a big time achievement for me," he said. "I'm glad I stuck with it because this really was a big opportunity to fail with the potential for bad weather and injuries during my training, but I stuck with it and walked

away with world records."

He could have easily walked away with only one world record. After crossing the English Channel, he had a pulled muscle in his shoulder, and roughly an hour into his paddle in Loch Ness, he paddled over to his escort boat and told them he'd paddle for another 10 minutes and then he'd quit. "I was completely beat up from the English Channel paddle," he said. "It was like riding a bull for 5 hours."

But, O'Shaughnessy paddled on, and 10 minutes later he paddled back to the escort boat and said, "Give me a piece of gum." He went on to break the record for crossing Loch Ness by eleven minutes. "That was probably the toughest mental and physical challenge I've ever faced, and I came through it, largely due to having set my goals ahead of time and just having that desire to achieve them," he said.

By the time he reached the Irish Sea, it became clear that for all of his training and preparation, luck played a major factor in attaining his final goal. The Irish Sea is usually extremely choppy, and the weather is hellacious for paddleboarding, but when the time came for O'Shaughnessy to set-off on his paddleboard,

the weather was unusually hot, there was a 10 mile per hour tide going with him, and the sea was calm. "All I had to do was be a fallen soldier on the board," he said.

O'Shaughnessy broke the record by more than three hours.

"I wanted a pure gut check as to who and what I was all about as I approached

50. The last few years I had wanted to challenge the English Channel record," he said.

O'Shaughnessy upped the anti by adding the Irish Sea and Loch Ness to his list of goals. "You achieve 50 percent of the goals you write down," he said. "So why not write goals?" ♣



Boards Fundamental in Chapter Successes

Embezzlement has escorted many corporations and individuals to their corporate death beds. So how is it that the Iota Zeta chapter at Rollins was able to withstand an embezzlement scandal and become a chapter doing out advice to struggling chapters?

The answer lays in three words...Board of Trustees.

Iota Zeta was on its way to closing, with a chapter president and treasurer who were embezzling chapter funds to finance spring break trips and shopping sprees. The chapter lacked leadership.

But, its Board of Trustees, along with a few young chapter members, decided it was time to get involved and make a change. "Things had gotten so lost without the guidance of the board," said Vice-President Dylan White, Rollins '05. "The chapter didn't know the right way to do so many things."

This is where a Board of Trustees can make a big difference. BOTs can provide a steady institutional memory of the operation of the chapter, and provide a great deal of experience and support. "Most think of BOTs as just people who are there to implement the rules," said Rollins Chapter President Brandon Burns, Rollins '05. "But it's open discussion, trying to achieve a goal. It's good to have their experience to draw on."

Boards also help make sure chapters are doing things correctly, like officer transitions.

"You need teachers to show you what to do," said White. "That's where you start traditions of doing things the way they're supposed to be done."

"Without someone there to help hold the chapter accountable, it's difficult to make sure the chapter is getting all the things done that it needs to," said Rollins and Kentucky BOT Chairman Bob Goldman.

Now, the Iota Zeta chapter is playing teacher to other groups. The chapter took a trip to the Iota Omega chapter at Bloomsburg to help brainstorm ways to transform the chapter.

Five men from the Iota Zeta chapter, along with Goldman, traveled to Bloomsburg for the weekend retreat to brainstorm ideas on all aspects of chapter operations.

"We saw ourselves being helped by our board and realized that transformation is possible," said White. "After seeing it in ourselves, we want to help where we can."

Alumni Associations Provide Example of Life After College

Alumni Associations are the perfect opportunity to stay active with the Fraternity, connect and reconnect with brothers, and help support your local chapter.

"It's essentially a one-stop shop for alumni involvement opportunities," said Chief Alumni Officer Terry Turman, Oklahoma State '94. "You get to connect with guys from your era, from past eras, and from future eras...all while supporting the chapter you love."

"You find guys all the time and you reconnect and connect them to other ATOs," said Alumni Association president Bert Sams. "It's a great way for alumni to reconnect with old buddies. We talk about brotherhood and friendship and the bonds we create, and it's up to us to make sure those last."

One of the fundamental purposes of the alumni association is to keep alumni connected and informed about what's happening with the chapter. When joining an alumni association, you receive chapter newsletters, e-mail updates, and other benefits and opportunities that you wouldn't have otherwise.

"The fun part is identifying successes or tragedies or joys and sharing that with each other," said Sams. "We have such a unique opportunity to create friendships and bonds in the Fraternity that can truly be lasting...we need to take advantage."

Alumni Associations provide an important way to help the chapter, and enforce the belief that ATO is a lifetime experience. "It's a great benefit for the chapter, because you have alumni there for recruitment and just for overall support," said Sams. "You've got to build the bridges, keep people involved and keep them informed. You're the example of what happens next."

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


